Gertrude (Trudy) Ederle was born in New York City in 1906. She learned to swim at her family home on the Jersey shore. In 1918 she went to the Women's Swimming Association in New York for coaching.

When she was just 15, Trudy competed in the Joseph P. Day Cup Race. She won this 3½ mile race, beating out 51 other champion swimmers from the United States and England. A month after this race, she broke seven world records. The following year,
